Thoughts to Ponder.....Are you addicted to driving.... or flying... to other cities for one main reason? TO DANCE! Do you constantly check the calendar for the next big dance event? Do you regularly check the internet for the schedule of your favorite band? Do you enjoy extremely high energy dancing partners, fast twirls, and smooth dancing? Will you travel long distances (or short distances) to hear creative, unique, live music that makes you want to dance to oblivionnnnn? If you've answered yes to any of these questions, it's a fact, YOU are a DANCE GYPSY!

A Dance Gypsy experience can be as simple as a short drive to Birmingham, Chattanooga, Nashville, or Sewanee. Or it can be a quick overnight trip to dance in Atlanta. A dance weekend is another extended gypsy opportunity to experience great music, energetic dancers, lots of smiles and new friends. Some weekend dances offer classes in various dance styles, music jams, drumming and caller programs. You may be dancing with 150-300 experienced dancers. Dancing for up to fifteen hours over a weekend brings you home, exhausted, and READY FOR THE NEXT DANCE!

The costs of being a dance gypsy vary. Many contra dancers are eager to offer space in their homes for visiting dancers. Camping or cabins are available at many dance weekends and some hotels offer discounts to dancers. The initial registration fee ranges from \$35 to \$85, and some include cabin rental and food. Getting To Know You

<p>Doug is a self-proclaimed “computer nerd.” He has two sons and they both are great dancers. Matt is a sophomore at Montevallo University and Chris is a senior at Huntsville High School. Doug says he can juggle a bit but basically has no time left for hobbies since he’s busy with dancing and computers.</p> <p>He has been contra dancing more than eight years and thought it was great fun from the beginning. He says, “I hope my foolish grin has not alarmed other dancers.” He likes the fellowship, exercise, and great music at contra dances and says, “When the caller has a dance that flows, and the band has a groovy medley going with all the dancers effortlessly moving through the figures up and down the line....what could be better?”</p> <p>He has danced in San Francisco and Palo Alto when on business trips. He has also gysied to Atlanta, Nashville, Birmingham, Mentone, Chattanooga, Brasstown, Tuscaloosa and Syracuse, NY.</p> <p>Doug is the NACDS producer – which means that he is responsible for securing all of the callers and bands for dances and he also sets up the dance hall for each dance. He got off to a great start this year since Carol Mebane had already lined up several bands and callers and also many dancers have been willing to help with set up and clean up at the Saturday night dances. He has also been a great help in learning to do the newsletter.</p> 	<p>Jane is a very active caller in dance circles and has called dances locally and from coast to coast.</p> <p>In 1992 her husband died of cancer and her sister insisted that she should not just devote herself to running the business, so she started dancing. Later her curiosity about bands and their role at dances and the encouragement of Kathy Anderson led her to being a caller. Jane said, “When I started dancing, the contra community I entered knew of my recent past and made the experience of dancing all warm and fuzzy and comforting. When I started calling, a band and a group of Elderhostel encouraged me greatly, giving me the desire to continue. So I strive to pass that positive experience on to others.”</p> <p>Jane and Terry (her present husband) are retired from traveling sales jobs which gave them the opportunity to dance all over the country. They retired in 1999 but still enjoy traveling. In fact, Jane attends at least one summer dance camp every summer.</p> <p>Besides being an active grandmother of 14 by helping with homework, going to softball games, etc., she is a busy neighborhood volunteer. She is involved in the US Coast Guard Auxiliary, Lake Watch at Lake Guntersville, Water Watch with Auburn University and TVA on the Tennessee River, Grant, Alabama CERT, Storm Spotters, Marshall County Citizens Police Academy and more. She even teaches boating safety at Scottsboro High School.</p> <p>Jane’s philosophy – “Life is good. I learned early that you never know about tomorrow so enjoy today to its fullest!”</p> 	<p>Harry has been a computer science teacher at UAH for 15 years and loves it. His family includes cats and a sister in Memphis who has been a dancer longer than him. They had both honed their dancing skills by doing international dancing for many years prior to contra dancing.</p> <p>Harry’s hobbies include playing guitar and singing at the Kaffeeklatsch acoustic open mike, and he is involved in local theater. He will be directing a little musical for Renaissance in January. And he enjoys cooking, baking bread, wine-tasting, bike-riding, swimming.</p> <p>Harry began contra dancing in 1987 in Charlottesville, Virginia, and his first impressions were mixed. He said, “When the caller was good, I had a great time, but I remember one time the caller was doing complicated dances that I didn’t get, and though people helped me, I felt frustrated. So, as a caller, I learned that dances don’t have to be complicated to be fun, and I try to help beginners get over those first few doubts so they can learn to enjoy the dance.”</p> <p>When asked if there was anything unique he could tell about himself, Harry said, “Everyone’s unique, but I am one of the few people still around who contracted polio as an infant. Dancing is one of the many ways for me to affirm that I can establish my own limitations. At one point I was concerned that I would not be able to dance when I got older, so I learned to be a caller as a way to stay involved in the dance community. Luckily, I’m still dancing.”</p>
